Mission of the Centre

The welfare of animals has been on moral, social, and legal agenda since the 19th century, and many countries have made significant progress in passing animal welfare legislation. The concept of animal rights as such has also existed for many years but has received less attention for a variety of reasons, including its fundamental challenge to the view of animals as property. As a result, there is relatively little solid legal work on the understanding and promotion of animal rights—what they might look like, and how to deal with the social and economic consequences.

We propose the launch of the Cambridge Centre for Animal Rights Law—the UK's first academic institute dedicated to rigorous research, teaching, and policy-work on the fundamental legal rights of nonhuman animals. As academics at Cambridge, we are uniquely well positioned to start exploring and defining principles, developing norms, understanding consequences, and drafting national legislation and international treaties. Our Centre will be able to attract highly competent academics, lawyers, and legal philosophers as lecturers, researchers, and visiting scholars. The Centre's output will be cutting-edge research in top journals, conferences that attract influential scholars and thought-leaders, and concrete policy proposals that get the attention of policy-makers and legislators in the UK, Europe, and worldwide.
